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President's Message

2017 was a very challenging and rewarding year. On the rewarding side I was able to hunt more than a dozen times and was able to bag a rag-horn bull elk. On the challenging side, my family had to deal with two separate fires in Montana the Lodgepole Complex fire and the Lolo Peak fire. 30,000 acres of my sister's ranch was burned in Garfield County and my crew went over to help them fix nearly 30 miles of fence. After four days of fence fixing I was called back home to Florence as my own home had been placed under mandatory evacuation. The fires were spectacular and devastating. Ultimately my home and my family were fine after the fires died out. It is enlightening to see the strength of the human spirit and the caring of Montana communities when hard times come around. Those fires are not unlike the challenges we face in the Montana Wild Sheep Foundation (MTWSF).

Our chapter is continually being asked to help out other organizations, weigh in on legislative actions, or put feet on the ground to help with sheep captures. Fires, whether literal or figurative will always face those of us that fight for those who cannot fight for themselves.

I was honored that the board elected me president of the MTWSF Chapter. Brian Solan left some big shoes to

fill and thankfully he's agreed to stay on as Volunteer Executive Director. My first couple of months have been very informative, challenging and fulfilling. Our chapter has weighed in on some federal and state wild sheep issues. We are looking at a possible land acquisition near Plains, Montana and are helping fund a multi-faceted, ten-year project in the Petty Creek area of Western Montana.

We have totally remodeled our website and continue to improve it for our members. Many of our board recently attended the National WSF Sheep Show where we saw our Montana Governor's Wild Sheep tag sell for \$335,000! Now our board is feverishly preparing for our 2018 MTWSF fundraiser and banquet in **Bozeman on March** 9th and 10th. There is more seating at this year's MTWSF banquet, but don't wait to purchase your tickets as we fully expect to sell out. 





Short Story by Jim McEnroe

After 37 years of applying for a Montana bighorn sheep tag, I finally drew one in 2017 in Area 680.

I'd had sheep fever since age 16, when I drew North Dakota's once-in-a-lifetime permit and harvested a 13-year-old California bighorn in the Badlands south of Medora. I never thought I would ever draw the Montana permit, and was shocked when I not only did but also drew a Montana mountain goat tag for this year as well.

My wife Ashley and I went to Area 680 on an early September bowhunt and found the perfect ram. After returning two weeks later during rifle season, we backpacked in again and scoured the Breaks for the same ram over three days. We finally found him three miles, and several uphill climbs, farther north. I took him with my .300 Win Mag at 168 yards. Together, Ashley and I skinned, boned and packed him out in one tough afternoon of toting our heavy loads back to the truck. Then, we hiked back in to dismantle our camp and pack that out, too, returning to our rig with everything just an hour after dark.

P.S. In October, Ashley and I were at it again, when I harvested a nice billy goat near my home in Big Sky.





It was a frigid early November morning on the last day of my sheep hunt. The temperature was hovering just above zero with almost a foot of snow on the ground. My husband and I made our way up to the Front Range and planned on hiking back into the mountains on a trail we had been on earlier in the season. We hiked for a few hours in the deep snow and drifts making a fresh path on the trail that was below a hard crusted layer. We spotted a plump little cinnamon bear on our way up who looked like he was getting ready to find his den. We continued the laboring hike for a while and finally got back to the spot that we wanted to check out. We went up a very steep hillside in the wet snow and wind searching for a higher vantage. It was so difficult that we decided to turn back. We searched for any sign of sheep, rested our legs and then headed back down to the trail.

We started back down our busted trail and walked for about ten minutes when suddenly my husband turned around and waved me forward. I thought he may be pointing out the bear again but when I looked over his shoulder it was a bighorn ram walking towards us on our trail! He was all alone and was only about 100 yards away and I made a split second decision that I wanted to take a shot. I got down but couldn't see well



through my scope and my husband had me reposition. The ram never slowed or stopped his ascent. At this point he was only about 20 yards away and I quickly pulled the trigger. After I shot him he ran towards us at a dead sprint, finally veering to our right within ten yards. He died mid stride falling off about a 60 foot cliff down to the middle of the ravine on a very steep snow covered scree slope.

Now the hard work started. We climbed down to him and what an amazing animal he was. His horns were beautiful and his body was huge. Luckily, we were able to get some pictures with him as our phones were dying on and off due to how cold it was. We gutted him and then hiked out as it was getting late and very cold. We came back the next day with a group of family and friends to pack him out. I feel so fortunate to have had the chance to hunt for, and harvest such a beautiful animal as well as to have been able to do it with my husband.



It was different than anything I've ever done. With only 2 tags given, so much of the tension we feel hunting these days - that someone will beat you to a place or luck into being where you should have been-just isn't there. It has to be like going back 40 years! I spent 10 days hunting and saw sheep every day and rams most of those days. One day I saw over 40 sheep.....and not one other soul hunting them!

So in answering Jordan, kind of twilight experience is that?! I wasn't lying when I said no. Envy has no place in the gift of this experience. I'm sure there are bigger sheep Out of the blue last year, Alex called me from Kansas on the mountain, but this one's mine; and that makes City and (at 23 years old) said "will you take me huntit special! I hope those who haven't had the chance, ing". I thought "who are you and where'd you come get to do it sometime. It's truly remarkable. I can't help from?" She shot her first deer last fall and is hooked. but be humbled and blessed by it all!





This sheep was taken in November in unit 422-20. It is my first (and only) sheep I have ever gotten, and as a life-long Montana resident it is the first time I have drawn the tag in approximately 21 years of applying. I had max points, and the odds finally worked out for me!

I put about 4 days of hunting in during September, another 5 days in October, and was able to get my sheep on the third day of my November trip. On the day I shot my ram my brother, and hunting partner, happened to be with me. We were actually on the way "out" of the area so that he could travel back home to Bozeman for work. I had spotted one ram earlier in morning while conversing with another tag holder, and went up into the high ground chasing after it. By the time we got close enough to get a really decent look at it something spooked him and the two other rams that had appeared and a few ewes. They all ran off before I had an opportunity.

On the hike up to that ram, we had observed 10 other rams in an area about 3/4 a mile away that we had seen the previous day, but had been unable to close the deal due to daylight and high winds. Once the first band of sheep ran off, we worked toward that group we had watched the previous day. We managed to get

within about 200 yards of the rams, but they stood up and bunched up so tight that a shot was not possible on the ram I was interested in before they headed off up the hills. Due to the time of day and my brother having to return to Bozeman for work at a reasonable hour, we headed out of the area and were hiking out when I spotted 'my ram' about half mile BELOW where we had parked the 4 wheeler to begin our hike that morning. After working our way through several small bands of sheep and mule deer bedded in the area, I finally spotted my ram asleep under some trees. We stayed and watched him sleep for probably 45 minutes before he got up and started milling about.

It took probably another 45 minutes for him to clear from the trees and the other ewes in the area and finally present me with a 200 yard broadside shot. I took the opportunity, and then the work began! It was a terrific experience and a great hunt!

This sheep was harvested in 216, upper Rock Creek on 10/26. Tight curl, so will be in the 177+ range and because of 37" horns and 15" bases will not make the 180, but should make the 175+ after shrinkage. He was the best looking one we saw, and we saw lots of rams. Problem was that he was by himself and offered little comparison, and was a long shot at about 335 yds. So I am pleased with the hunt and the result. My son was with me which also made it special. I am 72 this past fall so the assistance in packing out the quarters and back straps was also appreciated.
